The WWP EN Team wishes all of you happy holidays & we look forward to stopping violence against women and holding perpetrators accountable with you in 2020!


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2019 #ResponsibleTogether Campaign

Throughout the 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence, member organisations from Albania, Bulgaria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Cyprus, the Czech Republic, Italy and Spain organised activities to address men's sexualised violence against their partners.



- **64% of European women** who experienced sexualised violence <u>since</u> the age of 15, experienced this violence from a current or ex-partner.
- Prosecution rates for rape are still abysmally low in almost all European countries
- Victims of intimate partner sexual assault sustain more severe genital injuries
- Perpetrators are more likely to use several types of violence, e.g. strangulation or beatings, to subdue their partners – leading to serious and potentially life-threatening harm
- Women who experience intimate partner sexualised violence are less likely to go to the hospital, putting them at a <u>higher risk for infection with</u>

sexually transmitted diseases such as HIV

What can we do?

Men must start holding each other accountable for their violence. It has become clear that women's voices and experiences are not taken seriously enough to change the current situation - men must increasingly step up and take responsibility for

- publicly and consistently challenging and changing sexist attitudes,
- addressing the harm caused by pornography use, as well as
- believing survivors and respecting their stories.

We must work to make perpetrators visible, in the language that we use, but also in the crime statistics. Governments must take the necessary steps to ensure that survivors receive support and perpetrators are held accountable. The Istanbul Convention contains important regulations support and protection of survivors of sexualised violence, as well as articles on addressing men's violence against women. It is crucial that countries sign, ratify and effectively implement the Convention.

FOMEN (violence prevention with migrant men)

After the FOMEN kick-off meeting in Graz at the start of October, work has officially started on the project and expert workshops are being held by partners across Europe. The first of these in Berlin, ran by Daliah Vakili, took place at the beginning of December and was a great success. Participants had valuable discussions on masculinity, migration and violence prevention. Similarly, the other expert workshops were extremely helpful in gathering best practices in relation to violence prevention. MARVOW (violence against elderly women)

At the end of November, we attended the MARVOW kick-off meeting in Vienna. Important planning-related discussions took place and next year will see the first training sessions held across the partner countries in Austria, Estonia and Greece.

MIC (promoting caring masculinities)

The very first MiC newsletter was sent out with information from the project. An in-depth article on paternity leave in Spain was published for this newsletter, and is <u>available to read</u> on the MiC website. ENGAGE (training frontline professionals)

After two years, the final ENGAGE conference took place mid-November in Florence. We're proud of all the hard work that went into developing an innovative 4-step process for engaging perpetrators. The finalised roadmaps and training packages are now available on our website and free to download. CONSCIOUS (decreasing recidivism after prison)

Our partner in the CONSCIOUS project, ASL Frosinone, held a training day for healthcare professionals at the end of October and presented lessons learned during the first year of the project. So far, 18 perpetrators of domestic violence and 24 perpetrators of sexualised violence have started the treatment programme.

New Webinars Online

We have two brilliant new webinars now available on our website. Rus Ervin Funk gave us tipps on how to screen for men's use of sexualised violence and Heinrich Geldschläger shared background on the ENGAGE project, lessons learned and evaluation results.
