# Interview with Heinrich Geldschläger

For the ENGAGE Project, which concluded in December 2019, organisations from Spain, France, Italy and Germany developed a roadmap and training for frontline professionals interacting with male perpetrators of domestic violence.

Heinrich Geldschläger, from the Spanish project coordinator CONEXUS, agreed to sit down with us and share some of the central project outcomes and lessons learned.

"We saw that organisations delivering the ENGAGE training to frontline professionals (e.g. social or health services, child protection, police) increased the referrals to their perpetrator programmes and improved collaboration with frontline services"

# **Coalition Against Stalkerware**

Together with other NGOs and leading anti-virus companies, WWP EN is a founding member of the Coalition Against Stalkerware



Stalkerware is software that enables perpetrators to monitor the activities of their partners without their knowledge or consent. Installed on a cell phone, these apps grant access to the most private information, such as text messages, location of the phone's user and much more. According to Kaspersky, a globally leading cybersecurity company, the number of users facing stalkerware rose by 35% in the last year, while the European

Institute for Gender Equality found that "70 % of women who have experienced cyber stalking, have also experienced at least one form of physical or/and

sexual violence from an intimate partner".

# Call to Action: A Domestic Abuse Perpetrator Strategy for England And Wales

"We want to turn the tide on domestic abuse. It is not acceptable, and it is not inevitable. The right interventions at the right time can stop abuse from occurring, recurring, or escalating."

In January 2020, over 60 women's support services and perpetrator programmes, with the support of key researchers, the Royal College of General Practitioners, and police and crime commissioners, launched a Call to Action. In this ground breaking document, they demanded that the government include a comprehensive Perpetrator Strategy in their Domestic Abuse Bill. The debates on the bill are ongoing and we will update you on the results of this great action in our next newsletter.

The 2019 annual report gives an overview of all the exciting developments and activities in our network that have been going on over the past year, such as



#### **ASAP**

In February, we travelled to Zagreb for the latest meeting for the ASAP project, where we are working to develop a systematic approach to gender-based violence which includes both victim support services and perpetrator programmes. Some impressions of the meeting can be seen <a href="here">here</a>. The testing of results and policy guidelines, which highlight the excellence of the model, is almost finished and will be disseminated soon.

#### **CONSCIOUS**

A summary of WWP EN's work on the Conscious project can be found on the new project <u>YouTube channel</u>, which is also home to further project updates (mostly in Italian). Additionally, project partner ASL Frosinone held three Conscious info days in February with over 160 participants. The info days were focussed on dissemination of project results, as well as the possible extension of the project (both regionally and nationally). Preparations have begun for the final conference, which will be held in Italy in June and which will show the pilot path of the Conscious experience.

#### **FOMEN**

Work on the FOMEN project has been continuing steadily since the last update. Project flyers have been produced for all project partners in multiple languages. The flyers can be found on the FOMEN website <a href="here">here</a>. 9 expert workshops were held with a total of 122 professionals and field experts across Europe, which resulted in valuable information for use in further project work. The FOMEN questionnaire is online now as part of the Needs and Resources Analysis of the project. The survey is divided into two parts and investigates the needs of male migrants based on gender-based violence preventive work and best

practices based on this topic. The results will be published end of April 2020. The next project meeting will be taking place in Zagreb at the end of March. If you are interested in hearing more about the FOMEN Project, you can sign up to the newsletter here.

#### **MARVOW**

The first project press release has been published and is available on our website <a href="here">here</a> if you want an in-depth overview of what's going on. Additionally, as part of WWP EN's work on the MARVOW project, we have spent the past couple of months producing a report on multi-agency approaches to working with perpetrators. We would like to thank the participating organisations once again for their time and insights. You can read the report <a href="here">here</a> under "Project Deliverables".

The next project meeting will be taking place in Estonia at the beginning of April. This meeting will be a coordination event, as well as a mutual training event among partners. WWP EN will add its experience in working with perpetrators, as well as knowledge about the cooperation between perpetrator programmes and victim support services to the meeting.

#### MiC

The MiC Project has a new partner in Spain - the Municipality of Madrid has formalised their participation in the project! Additionally, partners have started carrying out interviews with stakeholders, companies and male carers. The next project meeting will be taking place in Oslo in May.
