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The CONSCIOUS Project

Since 2018, WWP EN has been working alongside ASL Frosinone and other Italian partners on the CONSCIOUS Project.



AN INTER-SYSTEMIC MODEL FOR PREVENTING REOFFENDING By Perpetrators Guilty of Sexual Abuse and Domestic Violence

CONSCIOUS is aimed at reducing recidivism among men convicted of sexual and domestic violence. The project developed a model of cooperation between prisons, probation services, judges, lawyers and NGOs. Additionally, facilitators were trained and started holding perpetrator groups for domestic and sexual violence offenders in several prisons in Italy.

The CONSCIOUS Project is **ending in December 2020** and partners are currently in the process of last evaluations. A final conference will be held online to celebrate the innovative CONSCIOUS Project and its results. Through CONSCIOUS, partners learned about what does and doesn't work when trying to reduce recidivism. CONSCIOUS Project Workshop

At the 2020 WWP EN Annual Conference, the CONSCIOUS project coordinators held a workshop. Recent CONSCIOUS Publications

The "Socio-Economic Study", as well as the "Feasibility Study" include **crucial European policy and research overviews** for prisons, probation services or

NGOs looking to address the issue of collaboration, as well as recidivism, in

their criminal justice systems.

Over the summer, two new studies were published within the framework of the CONSCIOUS project.

- The <u>Socio-Economic study</u> offers an analysis of the <u>phenomenon of</u> recidivism, as well as its socio-economic impact on various levels:
 economic costs, healthcare and legal costs, and personal impact. These costs are considered in relation to society as a whole, survivors and their families.
- The <u>Feasibility Study</u> provides an analysis of legislative context, prison environment and best practices regarding perpetrator treatment in Europe. Additionally, the study considers which conditions would be necessary to replicate the CONSCIOUS Project in other national contexts.


Getting started: How to set up a perpetrator programme - 21-30 October, 11:00-15:15 CET

WWP EN Members' Voices: Dom Duga-Zagreb



MARVOW

In September, WWP EN participated in the third international MARVOW partner meeting alongside other partners from Austria, Estonia and Greece. Naturally, due to the ongoing Covid-19 situation, the meeting was held online. Nevertheless, we were happy about the chance to discuss our work and to hear about future plans for project development. WWP EN is looking forward to contributing more expertise and research about perpetrator work during the coming months, with the aim of developing a functional multi-agency approach to tackling violence against older women. MiC

Work on the MiC project has continued over the past few months. WWP EN is about to start work on the second MiC project newsletter alongside other project partners and project coordinator UNED. Additionally, Marc Gärtner, who works for both WWP EN and VMG (Austria) on the MiC project, is working alongside Elli Scambor on the "Men & Care" paper for APuZ:

Abstract:

Männer und Care bildeten lange ein wenig diskutiertes Themenpaar, doch seit einige Jahren ändert sich dies langsam. Veränderungen in Geschlechterverhältnissen und Männerleitbildern, nicht zuletzt in Bezug auf

Vaterschaft, befördern dies. Doch wie sind die gesellschaftlichen Rahmenbedingungen für Männer, stärker in Familie und Careberufen engagiert zu sein? Und wie kann das Ziel erreicht werden, hier zu mehr Geschlechtergerechtigkeit zu kommen?

For a long time, men and care formed a marginal topic pair, but this has been slowly changing for some years now. Changes in gender relations and male role models, not least in relation to fatherhood, are promoting this. But what are the social conditions for men to be more involved in family and care professions? And how can the goal of achieving more gender justice be achieved?

ASAP

Recently, the ASAP Consortium met to discuss the next steps for the project and in particular, the national dissemination events and webinars which will take place starting in October. WWP is involved with organising the final conference in collaboration with the project coordinator. The first year of the ALIVE Project is drawing to a close at the end of September. So far, the capacity building programme has been designed in close collaboration with international and local partners. Additionally, despite COVID-19 restrictions, the training has been developed and organised and WWP EN, together with Italian partner Relive, has started to deliver this successfully online.

FOMEN

Work on the FOMEN Project is progressing well. The project partners are currently completing the intermediate reporting and developing modules for the FOMEN education programme. WWP EN is developing the modules on 'Gender & Masculinity' and 'Social and Intimate Relationships'. Additionally, the transnational report on needs and challenges was finalised by partners.
