### **Welcome to New WWP EN Member Contexto**



Contexto® is a research, training and intervention programme with intimate partner violence perpetrators that has been implemented at the University of Valencia since 2006 by a coordinated team of researchers and professionals.

The research carried out in Contexto® is mainly focused on the design and evaluation of the effectiveness of intervention strategies, as well as on the analysis of the main risk factors and intervention needs of the programme participants. In Contexto®, highly specialized training in intervention with perpetrators is provided and the team participates and regularly organizes scientific meetings to disseminate research results, as well as seminars and conferences.

As an intervention programme, Contexto® works both with men court-mandated, as well as with self-referred participants.

### **Project Updates**



The FOMEN project partners have had a busy summer hosting 'Leaders of Change' education programmes for migrant men. At WWP, the programme trained migrants and refugees to become leaders of change for gender equality within their communities. The following topics were discussed: gender and masculinity, self-care, emotion management, identification and prevention of social and gender-based violence, intimate relationships, LGTBQ+ and much more. We were joined by participants from all over the Arab world, Afghanistan and Chad.

We are continuing to work on the programme for our upcoming final conference next month, which will not only present the findings of this 2-year project, but will also include talks on migration and gender, white privilege, male privilege and antiracism. We are proud to offer a rich programme including experts from around the world. Don't forget to register to secure your place.

The results of the MiC project were presented at the 15th Conference of the European Sociological Association, 31st August-3rd September. Our Spanish MiC project partners presented the project at the online conference of ESA in Barcelona. Paco Abril (UNED and UdG) presented the research and trainings conducted in Spain in his speech on "The promotion of Caring Masculinities in Spanish Companies. How does it work?" and Irina Fernández (UNED), presented a research paper on "Caring Fathers in Europe: towards universal caregiver families?"



WWP has started planning the MiC final conference, which will be held in person (pandemic permitting) next year in Berlin. We anticipate 100 attendees from several European countries including policy makers and experts in workplace gender equality. We will send out a save the date very soon - register for the MiC newsletter or WWP events newsletter to stay informed.



At the beginning of the month, <u>MARVOW</u> project partners were finally able to gather again in Berlin for a face to face steering committee meeting. Project partners met over two days to share news, discuss upcoming roundtables and workshops and plan the final conference, which will be held in Vienna next spring! Watch this space for more details on these important events relating to elderly abuse and the findings of the MARVOW project.



We are excited to announce that the DeStalk online learning course will be available from 11th October. The course is aimed at three target groups: professionals of victim support services, professionals of perpetrator programmes and professionals working with government authorities. Through a self-paced e-learning package, professionals will understand what is defined as cyberviolence and stalkerware and how to recognise different forms of



Supporting the implementation of programmes for perpetrators of violence against women and domestic violence in Turkey and the Western Balkans Earlier in September, 28 participants from Kosovo and Serbia attended WWP training on evaluating perpetrator programmes through WWP's IMPACT Toolkit. One training was held for partners in Kosovo, and two for partners in Serbia. In both countries, perpetrator programmes have no evaluation systems, and they recognise the need both for monitoring and improving their work, and also for showing the impact of their work in combating violence.

Within the STOPP project, five programmes, one in Kosovo, two in Serbia and two in Albania, will establish evaluation systems. The project is run in partnership with UN Women as part of the regional programme 'Implementing Norms, Changing Minds: Ending Violence Against Women in the Western Balkans and Turkey,' funded by the European Union.
