Bundesarbeitsgemeinschaft Täterarbeit Häusliche Gewalt (Germany)

Criminal sanctions in Germany are currently being revised and policy-makers want to include the possibility of refering domestic violence perpetrators to therapeutic treatment. The German umbrella organisation for domestic violence perpetrator work (BAG TäHG) demands the inclusion of social training for the work with perpetrators of domestic violence in the draft law on criminal sanctions in Germany.

DeStalk

It has been a busy period for the DeStalk project as 132 professionals have already completed the e-learning course on gender-based cyber violence and stalkerware, and another 135 are currently finishing. Registration is currently paused, but we will re-open it in early October for everybody interested in learning to recognise different forms of online abuse in their anti-violence work. To help professionals develop further competencies in addressing cyber violence, the DeStalk team is also delivering workshops for professionals from victim-support services and perpetrator programmes. So far, we have reached over 180 professionals, including 90 members of the Italian network of women's support services (D.i.Re). Additionally, we are developing the Italian DeStalk pilot campaign over the following months.

ISEDA

We are pleased to announce the launch of our first "Horizon" project, ISEDA (Innovative Solutions to Eliminate Domestic Abuse). The ISEDA project, which aims to eliminate domestic abuse, will focus on working with law enforcement agencies and women's support services to build empowerment and safety tools for women. Another focus will be supporting the implementation of effective alternatives to imprisonment for perpetrators. This project will be an opportunity for our team to utilise and spread knowledge about the IMPACT toolkit and to enhance the capacity of police services and other key actors to tackle gender-based violence.
