PRESENTING AT COMPREHENSIVE SEXUALITY EDUCATION SYMPOSIUM

Our CONSENT partner Blanquerna presented the CONSENT project in the Symposium: "Comprehensive sexuality education: A global learning and sharing symposium on health, well-being, values, and equity" which was held from June 1st to June 3rd. The symposium brought together 500 young participants to promote dialogue on education for health, well-being and positive values on sexuality.



NEEDS ASSESSMENT ACTIVITIES TO INCREASE CAPACITIES OF EUROPEAN PROFESSIONALS

To be able to develop useful and adequate tools, the MOVE project partners are conducting needs assessment activities with men who use violence from a migrant background, frontline professionals and professionals working in specialised services. Assessing the needs of our target groups is a key step towards fulfilling key project objectives of increasing the capacity of EU perpetrator programme professionals to effectively work with male perpetrators with a migrant background, also within the COVID-19 context.



TRANSLATING IMPACT TOOLKIT TO GREEK, BULGARIAN AND ITALIAN

ASAP 2.0 project partners are currently translating the IMPACT toolkit into Greek and Bulgarian, and updating the Italian version, in order to evaluate the increased effectiveness of perpetrator programmes through the course of the project. The ASAP 2.0 project aims to increase the effectiveness of the treatment of perpetrators of violence through multiagency collaboration.
